Back Ground History



- \succ Child psychiatrist to work at the hospital and two bed unit built on pediatric floor.
- Many problems; decision between management and union to move the CYMH patients to the adult psychiatric unit.
- Many problems on adult unit; nurses engaged with union and community partners to address issue of caring for CYMH in-patients. Union and management agree to meet with Arbitrator Brian Foley.
- Arbitrator issued the Foley Consent Order in January of 2002. This order addressed such things as: there were not to be more than 3 children/adolescents at any one time, no children under the age of 6, ongoing staff education, close observation and documentation of children/adolescent patients, a 24hr security guard and the employer was to provide evidence of its ongoing commitment to creating a separate psychiatric unit for children/adolescents.
- In 2010 with many Professional Responsibility Forms (PRF) in hand nurses called for our union to take action (attempts to build programs within an existing adult system failed; staffing levels often meant children spent periods as long as 1-2 weeks in the locked Special Care Unit; allegations by patients of unsafe incidents; and plans and talk of a separate ward occurred but nothing materialized).

- **3)** Find out what other places are doing.
- **4)** Use the Canadian Nurses Association, Code of Ethics for Registered Nurses, as a starting framework.
- 5) Search for relevant articles.

KEY FACTS

• One in seven or an estimated 140,000 children and youth in B.C. suffer from mental illness (ages 0 to 18).

o Prior to implementation of B.C.'s mental health plan, only 11,000 children and youth received mental health support from the ministry in 2004/5.

o In 2006/07, MCFD served 19,952 children and youth through community-based CYMH (children and youth mental health) services.

*** In 2006 in B.C. 15 children and youth under age 19 died by suicide.
